## Transnational Terrorist Networks in Post-Jemaah Islamiyah Southeast Asian Borderlands

What is the state of Southeast Asian terrorist organizations today? Dr. Justin Hastings, an internationally recognized expert on terrorism, argues that in contrast to the heyday of groups like Jemaah Islamiyah and the Moro Islamic Liberation Front in the early 2000s, today's Southeast Asian terrorist and insurgent groups are structurally flatter, more decentralized and less



strategically coherent than before, but they are attempting to rebuild their networks in peripheral regions. What might these developments mean for Southeast Asian governments? How can governments take advantage of terrorist groups' disorganization without losing legitimacy among residents in peripheral regions?



Dr. Justin Hastings is Senior Lecturer in International Relations and Comparative Politics in the Department of Government and International Relations at the University of Sydney. He is the author of *No Man's Land: Globalization, Territory, and Clandestine Groups in Southeast Asia* (Cornell University Press, 2010) and is regularly interviewed by CNN, the BBC, Channel NewsAsia and other major international media outlets about terrorism and maritime security. He holds a Ph.D. and M.A. in political science from the University of California, Berkeley, and an A.B. in public and international affairs from Princeton University.
